IT'S HAPPENING ...

CONSTRUCTION MOVES AHEAD ON THE NEW MT LAUREL LIBRARY

Several years of fundraising and hard work have finally made the building of a permanent library in Mt Laurel a reality. Construction is moving along quickly with an anticipated opening in June. The property for the new building is a gift to the Friends of the Mt Laurel Library organization and the North Shelby Library from EBSCO. Moss Rock Building Company, Inc., a division of EBSCO, is building the library on a no-profit basis. Fundraising efforts will continue throughout the construction phase to complete and furnish the new library. A floor plan of the new building is on display at the current library location at 33 Olmsted Street.

Residents and friends of the community are encouraged to help with the final fundraising efforts by joining the library's "Circle of Friends," by purchasing a commemorative brick for the entryway, and by purchasing an item of furniture from the wish list. A special display will be set up at the library's book sale area at the Spring Festival to give everyone an opportunity to contribute. Circle of Friends forms, brick forms, and the wish list order sheets are also available at the current library location.



The new library, which is a branch of the North Shelby Library, will offer a more extensive collection and services than currently offered at the temporary location. Plans are underway for the summer reading program, which will include weekly movies and activities. See details on page five of this newsletter. KEEP MT LAUREL SPECIAL: KNOW YOUR CCRS

Beautiful communities don't just happen. They are the direct result of thoughtful planning and a conscientious effort to maintain a neighborhood's design principles. The Mt Laurel Codes, Covenants and Restrictions were established by our founders to protect the original design principles and keep Mt Laurel's natural beauty in the forefront. This is the first of a series of articles focusing on the "CCRs" and how they help make Mt Laurel a special place to live, work and play.



LANDSCAPE DESIGN The landscape design of Mt Laurel is reminiscent of the less formal landscapes of the English countryside where emphasis is on blending the "lawn" with the forest. Rather than have formal rows of shrubs that are the norm for suburban neighborhoods, Mt Laurel's ground covers were designed to make a seamless blend with smaller shrub masses. This adds instant age to the landscape, allowing trees of all sizes to blend with the plantings. Plantings come from the native species found here in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains, and are

intended to be cultivated in a manner similar to their natural occurrence. This gives Mt Laurel a more casual feel while retaining the authentic beauty of the surrounding scenery.

All front and side yards of any lot that are visible from any Common Roads (other than alleyways) or sidewalks adjacent to any Common Roads shall be landscaped in accordance with the Landscaping Regulations for Mt Laurel. A good rule of thumb is that if is not a native plant, it is probably not allowed in the front or side yard that is visible from the street (other than alleyways). No vegetable, herb or similar gardens or plants shall be planted or maintained in the front or side yards of any lot if the same would be visible from any Common Roads (other than alleyways).

A list of native trees and shrubs is available at the sales office, as well as the book of Mt Laurel Codes, Covenants and Restrictions. See the back page of this newsletter for this issue's "In Concert with Nature" which features native shrub selections for Mt Laurel.







VEHICLE PARKING Mt Laurel Residential Covenants, Codes and Restrictions prohibit the parking or storing of trailers of any kind, boats, commercial machinery or equipment of any nature on any lot unless placed in a wholly enclosed structure approved by the Mt Laurel Design Review Board. Parking of vehicles used

primarily for commercial purposes and vehicles with commercial writings on their exteriors is also prohibited. If you have a vehicle that needs storage, contact the Mt Laurel sales office for alternative suggestions. For more details on vehicles, machinery, and commercial vehicle restrictions in Mt Laurel, see CCR #15a and #15d.

AROUND TOWN AND BEYOND









ALABAMA OFFERS BEAUTIFUL NATIVE SHRUBS

As the article regarding Mt Laurel's CCRs on page two explains, Mt laurel was designed with a plan in mind for keeping the integrity of the natural landscape of this area intact. It may seem difficult to follow that plan when you are out shopping at large nurseries, ready to plant, but unsure of what to get. There are so many beautiful options, though, once you make yourself aware of Alabama's native shrubs and other plants and trees.

A perfect option, of course, would be the mountain laurel, which is a broadleaf evergreen shrub. In the late spring/early summer, these shrubs are covered with clusters of showy, bell-shaped flowers that are white to pink with deep pink spots inside. There are some nice, labeled specimens in the Bryson Square Arboretum, if you'd like to go get a closer look. Mountain laurels like to grow as an understory plant to wooded areas.

Two choices that would be happy alongside your mountain laurels would be native azaleas and viburnums. The deciduous native azaleas come in a variety of colors and are often much more fragrant than the evergreen, non-native types. Some examples of native azaleas are Alabama azalea, Admiral Semmes and Stonewall Jackson, which is available down at the Mt Laurel Grocery now. Native viburnums offer spring blossoms and nice fall color, as well as fruit that supplies a good food source for birds.

A popular shrub that you will find in many yards and common areas of Mt Laurel is the hydrangea. You don't want to buy the bigleaf Asian varieties of pink and blue, but instead look for the two Alabama native species, the oakleaf hydrangea and the smooth hydrangea, an example of which would be the cultivar "Annabelle." You might not have the brighter colors, but you will have impressive lacy flower clusters in the summer, great fall leaf color, and interesting winter stems gracing your yard across the seasons with these native shrubs.

You might also like to try something a little less common in your native plantings. A couple of natives with names specific to Alabama, Neviusia alabamensis/Alabama snow-wreath or Croton alabamensis/Alabama croton, are certainly worth a try. The Alabama snow-wreath resembles popular spireas to some degree with clusters of showy white, fluffy-looking

stamens in the late spring. They colonize to form a nice area of shrubs once established. The semi-evergreen Alabama croton has clusters of yellow-green flowers in the spring, but the more striking feature is the silvery undersides of the leaves. These plants are not as easily found as many other natives, but are sometimes available online or through local plant sales. Luckily there are some sales coming soon where you might just find these plants available to purchase.

The Birmingham Botanical Gardens Spring Plant Sale will be open to the public April 11-13 in the former J.C. Penney at Century Plaza. Check out the website for more information at www.bbgardens.org.
