


CONSTRUCTION NEARS COMPLETION ON THE NEW LIBRARY














Second row left: the view from the community room, through the main room into the reading room. Right: the community room with the Symthe Craftsman mica pendant and it's own exterior door.

Several years of fundraising and hard work have finally made the building of a permanent library in Mt Laurel a reality, and "it's even more stunning than we imagined it would be," according to Ann Price, chairman of the Friends of Mt Laurel Library's board of directors. "So many talented people have donated their time to making the building very special, and when the new library opens, we'll experience an additional layer of community enrichment when the expanded collection of books and additional programs are put into place.

Among the many who have donated their time and talent are Mt Laurel residents Kristin Prickett and David Brush. Kristin's expertise with color and design, and especially the selection of light fixtures, has been an important contribution to the building and design process. Likewise, David has donated his time and talent in creating a landscape plan using native selections and also assisting in working out exterior accessibility issues. Another Mt Laurel resident, Sandy Bishop, has refinished and refurbished several antique pieces that are going in the library, constructed and painted the coat racks, and fashioned a children's "tree trunk" chair from wood found in Mt Laurel. The chair will sit at the base of a tree mural in the children's room. Another talented Mt Laurel neighbor, Rorie Scroggins, will paint the children's room mural, and Anne Sturm is refurbishing a set of antique chairs for the community room.

It's summer in Mt Laurel, and neighbors are spending time on their porches enjoying the warm, sunny days. Mt Laurel's front porches promote a small town neighborliness that is reminiscent of the past. A porch can provide a leisurely setting to visit with next-door neighbors or provide a quiet setting in which one can be alone.

To maintain the beauty of our front-porch community, there are several points in the Mt Laurel Codes, Covenants and Restrictions that residents should remember when getting their porches and yards ready for summer:

- No interior furniture should be placed on the front porches. Outdoor furniture, excluding molded plastic furniture, is allowed.
- All front porches must be kept in a neat and orderly condition at all times.
- Firewood should not be stored on the front porch and should not be visible from the street.
- No clothing, rugs, or other items should be placed on a railing, fence or wall.
- Barbeque grills, or other types of outdoor cooking equipment, should not be visible from the street.
- American flags may be displayed at any time. Any other flags should not be displayed for more than 30 days. Banners are not allowed except for spirit flags which may be flown from Friday at 6:30 a.m. until Sunday at 11:59 p.m. on the weekend of the event.
- The landscaping for all areas visible from pedestrian paths and roads must be of a type native to the area, unless in a raised planter. A list of approved plants is located in the *Landscape Regulations*, which is available at the Mt Laurel Sales Center.
- Holiday decorations and lights should be removed no later than 30 days after the holiday.
- All additions of any kind must be approved by the Mt Laurel Architect Review Committee, including any temporary structures, fences or gates.

STAY COOL AT THE POOL!

School's out and the pool is open, so it's time for summer fun. Remember that it's SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK this year. Parents, please supervise your children closely so that we'll have another accident-free season. Here are a few reminders:

- Running on the pool deck is the number one problem and safety issue.
- Remember that the maximum depth of the pool is only four feet, so horseplay and diving are not permitted.
- · Pool Safety Rules and Regulations are posted on the right just past the gate along with emergency contact numbers.
- Children under age 14 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- The pool hours are 8:00 AM 8:00 PM
- The pool is open only to Mt Laurel residents and their accompanied guests. Do not give your pool key to anyone. Unaccompanied guests will be asked to leave the pool.
- Please remove all your personal items when you leave the pool. Personal items remaining on the pool deck will be disposed of after 24 hours.
- Food and beverages are allowed in the picnic area only. Glass containers are not allowed.
- If you're the last one at the pool before closing, please close the umbrellas and turn off the lights and ceiling fans.
- Remember that the pool facility belongs to the residents, and residents should do their part in keeping the pool and surrounding area clean and safe.



POOL PARTIES A resident may have a party at the pool, but the pool will remain open to residents. No parties may be scheduled between 11 and 2. Any gathering must be registered with the sales office. A children's party is limited to 15 children and must have one adult chaperone per each three children present. If the area is not left clean following the party, a \$50 fine will be imposed.

SPOONWOOD LAKE

Spoonwood Lake is a beautiful spot created for the enjoyment of the community of Mt Laurel, but residents are urged to use caution and responsibility when swimming and fishing. Swim at your own risk, as there is no lifeguard on duty. Here are a few rules for swimming and fishing:

- The lake is open only to Mt Laurel residents and their accompanied guests. Do not give your gate key to anyone. Unaccompanied guests will be asked to leave.
- All boats must be registered with the Mt Laurel office and have a registration number attached.
- Lake hours are dawn to dusk.
- Children under 12 must be accompanied by a responsible adult 19 years of age or older.
- Use caution when swimming. The water in the beach area reaches six feet deep within ten feet of the shore and is 40 feet deep at the floating dock.
- A resident may host a party at the lake, but the lake will remain open to the residents. Any
 gathering must be registered with the sales office. If you use the grill, please clean it and
 replace the cover and dispose of all trash.
- Fishing with live minnows is strictly prohibited. Introduction of foreign fish species can quickly disrupt a lake's ecosystem.
- No net fishing and casting nets allowed. This type of fishing results in a significant kill rate of bluegill and threadfin shad which are bass' primary forage supply.
- Limit on bluegill is ten per person. A healthy supply of bluegill is necessary to strengthen the largemouth bass population.
- Weekend anglers should not attempt to stock Spoonwood Lake with undesirable species of fish such as spotted bass, crappie or catfish. Trophy largemouth bass grow best when competition for forage is reduced.


THE GARDEN GROUP CONCLUDES



be a senior attending Indian Springs School. Emily will be available for babysitting and pet care this summer.





IN CONCERT WITH NATURE

"In Concert with Nature" is a regular newsletter section that features topics about the landscape and design concept of Mt Laurel and also items of seasonal interest for homeowners, contributed by Jill Walton. Jill is a Mt Laurel resident and holds the Master Gardener Certification.

DELIGHT IN NATIVE PERENNIALS

As you know, we are tasked with planting only native plants in our publicly viewable yard spaces. It's one of the many aspects that makes Mt Laurel special and unique—that we don't only "Leave the Trees," we respect all of the natural landscape of this area. In the last publication, we featured some native shrubs to think about for your property. You might, however, be more interested in something smaller and perhaps colorful enough to give all those non-native showy annuals and perennials a run for their money. We have some ideas for you there. You've probably been noticing some beautiful perennials in yards and common areas around town lately. Here are a few we've spotted since spring that you could use to adorn the view from your porch.

There are several varieties of **Beeblossom** (**Gaura**) blooming throughout Mt Laurel now. They produce pink or white blossoms on long arching stems that appear in the late spring and can continue throughout the summer. Most will form about a 12-inch clump of foliage with the flowering stems reaching 18 inches to three feet. They like full sun, and look very at home planted with that great standby, **Purple Coneflower** (**Echinacea**), which will eventually form a clump 18 inches to two feet and a stem height of two to five feet. Its standout blooms are nice for cutting and also for attracting butterflies. Also, if you the leave the seed heads on the plant through the winter, you'll find the birds happy for the available natural food source.



Another branch of the coneflower family with multiple showy choices is **Rudbekia**. Most of these are considered annuals or short-lived perennials, though they self-seed quite well, so no worries there. This wonderful group of about 25 choices includes **Black** and **Brown-Eyed Susans**, **Orange Coneflower**, and **Giant Coneflower**. There is yet another coneflower to consider, that's as bright and cheerful as any other, **Mexican hat**, which of course offers flowers that have the appearance of tiny sombreros. These all bear up wonderfully well to our hot and often dry summers, which of course, is one of the many reasons to use native plant materials. Once established, you won't have to spend all your "spare" time watering them to keep them from browning to a crisp.

If you're interested in something a bit softer in tone, there are plenty of choices, including **Dwarf Crested Iris**, which only grows six to eight inches tall. Its lovely springtime purple flowers would work very nicely in a shaded rock garden. If you'd prefer a blue/purple late spring bloom with a bit more stature, **Wild Indigo** is probably for you. With stunning three- to four-foot-tall blue spikes of flowers, it's perfect for just about any sunny spot you'd like to put it. It's also a host plant for multiple types of butterflies. For some blues (or whites or purples) that will cool
