



Thomas Hodo and his mother, Cindy, at the top of Pikes Peak in Colorado. The adventure also included zip lining near Manitou Springs.






PROGRESS AND CHANGE IN MT LAUREL AND THE DUNNAVANT VALLEY

Some time ago I was fortunate to be kept in the loop on email with some members of the original development team that founded Mt Laurel. Much of their conversation centered around their love for Mt Laurel and its wonderful legacy set in place under the leadership of Elton Stephens, the Founder. As they discussed their hopes and fears, I was impressed with their enthusiasm about Mt Laurel and its many unique qualities. The team that started Mt Laurel with such a wonderful vision and high ideals has been gone for some time now, but in their emails they all still hope that Mt Laurel will continue to prosper and stay true to its legacy. I decided to enter into their conversation by sharing with them the progress that has been made in Mt Laurel and the wonderful progress that has been made in Dunnavant Valley since their departure. I also wanted to share this information with you because as residents of Mt Laurel, most of these changes will have an effect on us.

For those of you who have recently moved to Mt Laurel, I want to go back in time to give you an idea how this progress came about. Much was due to the original founding team who did the preliminary groundwork establishing a most progressive vision and high values that set Mt Laurel apart from the run-of-the-mill developments not only in the state but nationally. This progressive vision and its values became the model for development in the County and were showcased in the Shelby County Comprehensive Plan.

Shortly before Elton left Mt Laurel, he and Rip Weaver, the Landscape Architect, established the Friends of Dunnavant Valley Greenway, Inc. (Friends) primarily for the purpose of slowing traffic on County Road 41 and discouraging attempts to turn the road into a four lane super highway. Dunnavant Valley Friends is composed of volunteer representatives from the Dunnavant Valley region. It is a non-profit, community-based corporation with membership open to the public.



Those of us who are volunteer members of this organization never thought in our wildest dreams that Friends would become as important a change agent as it has. One of those early changes occurred while working with the County to plan the Greenway from Hwy 280 to Hwy 25. As we planned, the County agreed to take responsibility for building the Greenway.

Over the years many of the members of Friends have become active in other efforts to improve the community and have been highly successful in achieving some noteworthy accomplishments.

Mt Laurel Public Library. Before Elton left Mt Laurel he, Rip and I started the work on the Mt Laurel Public Library. Because of the outstanding leadership from Mt Laurel resident Ann Price, enough money to begin construction has been raised, and a permanent library building will become a reality in the very near future. The Friends of the Mt Laurel Library Board of Directors is made up of representatives from communities throughout the area who work closely with Ann.

The Mt Laurel Garden Group has been excellent in working to develop the Bryson Square Arboretum. The organization also supported work to identify and describe the many special public places that are very important to the unique landscape design of Mt Laurel envisioned by landscape architect Rip Weaver. The Group has also been active in educating themselves and residents on the necessity of maintaining the original landscape design as established in the Mt Laurel Code and Landscape Design Book.

The *Mt Laurel Sippin' Seniors*, welcoming all ages, represents a solid core group anchoring the Mt Laurel community and supporting all activities in the community.

The Mt Laurel Connection, along with its predecessor the Chronicle, has served as a journal and has provided a record of life in Mt Laurel. Events, celebrations, new groups, births, deaths, the arrival and departure of businesses and neighbors are documented in this publication.

All this, the Mt Laurel community, the wider community of the Valley and in the County has been achieved through the dedicated work of people such as yourselves, other volunteers and Shelby County professionals working together to make the vision to build a better community come true. Their hard work has resulted in significant accomplishments that are excellent examples of civic pride and participation in the democratic process. Much of this is evident in the County Small Area Plan for Dunnavant Valley that represents the wishes of the people and their vision for the Valley. *

*The Small Area Plan will be submitted for approval to the Planning Commission of Shelby County in late October. A copy of the Small Plan is available for examination at the Mt Laurel Public Library.

IN CONCERT WITH NATURE



NOT ENTIRELY FOR THE BIRDS, BUT MOSTLY

"Birds are good ecological indicators. If you have a diverse native bird population, it's a sign that the ecosystem as a whole healthy," says Doug Tallamy, Professor and Chair of the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University Delaware and author of "Bringing Nature Home." And according to a 2009 government conservation report, nearly one-thi of all U.S. birds are endangered, threatened or in significant decline due to loss of habitat, invasive species and other threa such as mining and conversion of land to agricultural use.

We can make a difference in the health of the ecosystem though, by supplying some of what native and migrating birds need in our own individual landscapes. This means much more than putting out some bird feeders. True birdscaping means you help provide for the birds in multiple ways, including not only shelter and food for winter residents, but rest stops for migrating birds and safe places for breeding birds to raise their young.

Planting a variety of native plants in your yard can fill many of these needs. For example, shelter and rest stops can be found in native conifers, such as pines, bald cypress or eastern red cedar trees. Feeding the birds with seedheads from native grasses and wildflowers or fruiting shrubs helps different birds find what they need naturally and without expending more energy than necessary looking for food. Migrating hummingbirds will be glad to find tubular flowers available. Some good native vines to provide for them could include native honeysuckle or crossvine. Sources of water are also essential, and can be offered with simple shallow saucers or birdbaths. It is important to place water sources or birdfeeders in places that are not accessible, or at the least, not easily accessible, to feral or neighborhood pet cats.

A garden filled with native trees, shrubs and perennials can go a long way toward assisting nesting birds because, according the type of bird, they may use safe ground sites among the leaf litter for nesting, or cavities in trees or water areas like wildl ponds. Many species have specialized nesting needs, and you could consider providing for those by adding specific types nesting boxes for birds like bluebirds or chickadees.



We are lucky in Mt Laurel to have the help of the Mt Laurel Garden Group in providing habita for bluebirds already. Here is an update from Monie Allen:

Several years ago, the Mt Laurel Garden Group put out many bluebird boxes around town, hoping establish a robust bluebird population. They are happy to report that their efforts have been rewarde There are currently five boxes in various locations, which are monitored by several people. The bluebin usually have two or three clutches each summer, with an average of four eggs per box. Most of t newborns fledge, and you may have noticed that bluebirds can be seen all around town thanks to the
