MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER



Neighbors, instead of my usual message to the town, I've asked Traci and Scott Griffin, co-owners of The Red Shamrock Irish Pub, to tell you about "Hope for Gabe." Here is their story in their own words.

"With one phone call on June 6, 2008, our hopes, plans, and dreams changed forever. Our beautiful three-year-old twin boy, Gabe Griffin, was diagnosed with a terminal disease called Duchenne. We did not realize it at the time, but this disease has no cure and is tremendously under funded. Outside of the Jerry Lewis Telethon, there is hardly any funding going to this number one genetic killer of all boys in the world. One in every 3500 boys are born with this disease and because of such little funding, they have become known as "The Lost Boys."

We decided that while we are embarking on this new journey of life as a family, we are going to make the most of it! We wanted to create a legacy for our son no matter what happens down the road. That legacy came to be the Hope for Gabe Foundation (Hope for Gabe, Inc.). We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

It is the mission of Hope for Gabe (H4G) to ensure a cure for Duchenne is found in time for this and all future generations of boys inflicted with this horrible disease. Our number one goal is simple – to eradicate this disease! We will do this by directing all fundraising dollars into the hands of lab researchers or other organizations that are determined to find a cure. Hope for Gabe will raise these research dollars by organizing and developing creative fundraising efforts among friends, family, and concerned volunteers, while at the same time, serving as an information database for the most current clinical trials and research programs taking place. The old saying "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder" applies to most things in life including a managed lake like Spoonwood. In early May, the residents of Mt Laurel were abuzz that the lake had become as pretty and clear as it had ever been, but this really was a signal that the lake needed help. Clear water is cherished at the beach and deep-water reservoirs like Lewis Smith Lake, but adequate water clarity for a body of water like Spoonwood is only two to three feet. The root cause was the

lake was suffering from a pH imbalance. A pH imbalance results in an ecosystem disruption that negatively impacts all the organisms in the lake.

The Lake Committee and I solicited help from Southeastern Pond Management and together presented an action plan to EBSCO who immediately gave us the green light to do two things. The first was to apply a safe herbicide that would eradicate the rapidly growing pondweed (filamentous algae) which grows from the lake bottom and had just begun to break the water's surface. (Excessive water clarity provides adequate sunlight for the undesirable weed to grow, well, like a weed.) The herbicide was applied in mid-June and appears to have eliminated the



Let's keep the momentum going by adhering to the following rules:

weeds. The second was authorization to apply 50 tons of agricultural lime. Lime is a common element lakes require when built on highly acidic soil like Spoonwood. It was applied in mid-July and the pH is rising. A special thanks goes to EBSCO and Mr. Freeman for investing in our fabulous amenity. Submitted by Chad Eiler



Shelby County Development Services staff will conduct a Dunnavant Valley Small Area Plan Community Presentation from 6:00 PM until 8:00 PM at the Mt Laurel Elementary School Cafeteria on Thursday, August 8. Residents and stakeholders of the Dunnavant Valley are invited to attend this community presentation. County staff will discuss their draft plan prepared from a combination of four community workshops and guidance from the Dunnavant Valley SAP Steering Committee. A question and answer period will follow the presentation. Feedback regarding the proposed plan is encouraged and will be accepted through the end of August.

A presentation of the amended draft plan will be made to the Shelby County Planning Commission in October. The Shelby County Planning Commission is the final authority on the adoption of the plan. IN CONCERT WITH NATURE

"In Concert with Nature" is a regular newsletter section that features topics about the landscape and design concept of Mt Laurel and also items of seasonal interest for homeowners. This month's feature is written by Mt Laurel resident Frank Chitwood who works for Coosa Riverkeeper.

MT LAUREL'S COOSA CONNECTION

In nature, everything is connected in some way. And as people, we're more connected to nature than we are to social networking websites. Rivers and streams are the most popular members of the social network of the outside world. Our connections to rivers and streams in Mt Laurel are hard to overlook and, for some people like me, it's why we moved here.

Many of you may have noticed that I spend a good three to four days a week fly fishing on Spoonwood Lake when I get off work at Coosa Riverkeeper, a river conservation group where my job is to ensure the streams of the Coosa Valley are swimmable, drinkable and fishable. Spoonwood Lake is at the very headwaters of the North Fork of Yellowleaf Creek. That creek flows right past my office at The Narrows on Hwy 280 and then flows on to Lay Lake of the Coosa River in Wilsonville. Along the way are many important connections that help make the great quality of life in Mt Laurel possible.


When I'm done fishing on Spoonwood Lake, I head back home to Mt. Laurel Avenue, flip on my lights and cook dinner. I often start my dinner with a salad; I get my greens (and eggs) from the Mt Laurel Farm when they're available because they are local, fresh, organic and grown on a tributary to Yellowleaf Creek. As I am preparing my food, the water that goes down my kitchen sink (and indeed all the drains and toilets in Mt Laurel), goes to Double Oak Water Reclamation facility which, after treating the waste, discharges it to Yellowleaf Creek right by my office where the creek meets Old Hwy 280.

At the mouth of Yellowleaf Creek on Lay Lake, Alabama Power Company sucks up massive amounts of water to generate electricity at the Ernest C. Gaston Steam Plant which powers our homes. That coal-burning plant is backed up with hydropower from Lay Dam and six other hydropower operations just on the Coosa River. Without Yellowleaf Creek and the Coosa River, not only would I have nowhere to fish after work, but we'd also have to search elsewhere for a place to dump our wastewater and get an abundant supply of water for electricity generation.

Finally, there is the one use of our rivers that is more important than any other: drinking water. Mt Laurel, along with much of the Hwy 280 Corridor to Childersburg, is connected to the Talladega/Shelby Water Treatment Plant. This plant takes river water directly from the Coosa on Lay Lake upstream of Hwy 280 and treats it before sending it to many homes in north Shelby County, including Mt Laurel. South Shelby County also gets their drinking water from the Coosa, like so many other cities in the Coosa Valley like Gadsden, Pell City, Springville, Odenville and others.

So that's the great big cycle of our Coosa Connection: we bring water from Lay
Lake to our homes in Mt Laurel to drink, much of it ends up going down the drain in one way or another, after which it is put
back into Yellowleaf Creek where it will later be sucked up to generate power, then discharged back to Lay Lake where the
cycle can begin again downstream with other communities, just as it had happened several times upstream before reaching us.
